### Science

In the first half of the term, we will be learning about **Animals including humans**. We will:

- name a variety of animals including fish, amphibians, reptiles birds and mammals.
- sort animals into categories (including fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals).
- name the parts of the human body that I can see.
- link the correct part of the human body to each sense.

In the second half of the term, we will be learning about **Seasons Changes**. We will:

- observe and comment on changes in the season
- name the seasons
- suggest the type of weather in each season (This science topic is an ongoing topic and its themes will be referred back to throughout the year)

In the first half term, our inspirational scientists are David Attenborough (biologist) and Joan Proctor (zoologist).





In the second half term, our inspirational scientist is Christopher Wren (physicist, astronomer and inventor of the rain gauge).



You could help your child to learn more about these inspiring individuals.

Speak to your child about the weather and any changes they notice in the local environment.

When walking, encourage your child to look at and describe the natural world. You could even create some seasonal artwork and bring it in to show at school.

The StoryBots is an excellent programme (available on some streaming sites) which can help to answer scientific questions your children may have in an engaging and exciting way!
