Dear Parents and Carers,

Our big question will be: Antarctica: everlasting winter wonderland or changing landscape?</p> <p>After half-term our history-based topic will be Hola Mexico: Why did the ancient Maya change their way of life?</p> <p>In art the children will create art with an environmental message. This will take the form of a digital photograph with an environmental message overlaid.</p> <p>Computing will be an introduction to spreadsheets.</p>	YR: winter; Ernest Shackleton and Antarctica Y1: Splendid Skies - how weather has affected human choices? Y2: locating North and South Poles on maps; identifying, naming and locating 5 oceans and 7 continents. <p>English</p>	<p>Linked to our Frozen Kingdoms project, we will be exploring a range of quality texts to inspire our writing including 'The Last Bear' by Hannah Gold. These class books will inspire our writing across a range of genres including letters, diary entries, newspaper reports, poetry and narratives. SPaG will be taught daily to support writing and children will be learning spelling through investigations, practising both in class and at home. Throughout the spring term we will cover; using modal verbs to indicate degrees of possibility; using adverbs to indicate degrees of possibility (perhaps, surely); using brackets, dashes, or commas to indicate parenthesis; using expanded noun phrases to convey complicated information concisely; using the perfect form of verbs to mark relationships of time and cause; and using commas to clarify meaning or avoid ambiguity in writing. Guided reading will be taught daily in whole-class and small focus group sessions. A class book will be shared at</p>	<p>Units of work studied in Year 5 including the range of writing genres covered and new SPaG features.</p>	<p>Discuss the current topic with your child, ask them what their targets are and how they can improve their writing. Please encourage the use of a dictionary and thesaurus at home, and to take extra care with presentation when completing homework activities. Children will bring home a levelled reading book and should be encouraged to read every day and be able to answer questions about what they have read, as well as give their opinions about the text. Please ask your children a range of questions about what they have read to help develop their understanding. A list of example questions can be found on the 'Book Talk' page in your child's reading journal to help support you when reading with your child. Please sign your child's reading journal on a daily basis so we can see that your child has been reading at home. Reading Journals will be checked and signed in school once a week on their reading day. Details of which day this will be for your child to follow.</p> <p>Your child's reading book level is checked regularly to ensure continued progress. 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<p>Maths</p>	<p>We will follow the National Curriculum objectives in preparation for SATs in May 2024, with great emphasis on problem solving skills. Throughout the spring term, we will cover:</p> <p>Fractions, beginning with dividing fractions          Geometry: 2 and 3D shape, co-ordinates, translation and reflection          Measuring: converting measurements, area, perimeter and volume          Ratio and proportion, and line graphs, pie charts and conversions.</p> <p>During the term, Early Morning Work will consist of maths activities. There will also be opportunities to tackle SATs-style worded questions daily.</p>	<p>Year 6 maths builds upon, and consolidates, units of work that have been covered each year throughout your child's time at Trent, in particular formal methods of the four operations and fraction work studied in Year 5.</p>	<p>Practice the 2 - 12 times tables with your child to help them learn these facts and recall them quickly. 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Science	<p>Our first topic is Evolution and Inheritance: How do living things change over a time and a place? Linked with our geography topic, pupils will devise investigations to observe how conditions affect growth, identifying how plants are adapted to suit their environment in different ways and how adaption can lead to evolution. This will lead into our second science topic, Living things and their habitats. The big question will be 'What else is there beyond plants and animals?'. Pupils will describe how and why living things are classified into groups, including micro-organisms, plants and animals.</p>	<p>Y2: Living things and their habitats; Animals including humans  Y3: Plants; Rocks and Fossils  Y4: Living things and their habitats  Y5: Living things and their habitat</p>	<p>Discuss the topic at home and ask questions about what they have learnt. PE	<p>Children will have two weekly PE sessions taught by Mrs Kakouris. The lessons are on Mondays and Wednesdays. In PE this term, Year 6 will be doing Gymnastics for their indoor lessons. The focus will be: <i>Can they perform a range of balances with control?</i></p>	<p>Previous skills covered in Year 5 and teamwork.</p>	<p>Please support your child in remembering the days that they have PE and need to wear their full Trent uniform PE kits to school. 	<p>Pupils will be developing pair and group balances. They will be taught how to use counter balance and counter tension to create both patch and point balances. They will work collaboratively with peers to create sequences to perform to an audience.</p> <p>Their outdoor topic will be Netball. The pupils will be working on passing the ball using a variety of ways and catching it with control and accuracy. They will learn how to stop and perform a pivot when receiving a ball with accuracy. They will learn tactics on how to dodge into a space and mark a player to prevent them from getting the ball. Music	<p>Our topic in music will be 'Film Composition'. Pupils will work in small groups to compose music to fit with a short film clip based on their class topic. They will use a range of instruments and technology, and investigate musical ideas including tonality and dynamics.</p>		<p>You can support your child by discussing lessons or topics and encourage additional personal research or practice.</p>

French	<p>Ms Kenealy will teach a weekly French lesson during the autumn term where children will learn a range of French vocabulary and grammar through practical activities, games and role play.</p>	<p>Builds upon language and grammar taught in Year 6 so far.</p>	<p>You can support your child by discussing lessons, new vocabulary and topics, and encourage additional personal research or practice. ### **Equipment**

Thank you for purchasing the school pencil case containing the equipment your child will need for this term. The items your Year 6 child will need are: a clear pencil case, a pencil, a rigid 30cm ruler, a sharpener, a glue stick, a whiteboard pen, purple pen, yellow highlighter and a whiteboard rubber. These can all be purchased from School Money. Throughout the school year, your child may need some items in their pencil case replacing. Please check with your child on a regular basis if they need any new items. We would be grateful if you could support us in this. Please provide your child with a clearly labelled water bottle every day and a healthy snack in a clearly labelled pot if appropriate.

### **Behaviour Policy**

The Behaviour Policy has been clearly explained to all the children across the school. They understand the standard of behaviour expected of them and are responding positively. In Year 6, we will be encouraging and recognising positive behaviour by rewarding children who try incredibly hard in a variety of ways. We use the traffic light system of green, amber and red. Children who are working extremely hard will be rewarded with classroom dojos. As your children prepare for secondary school, we are increasingly trying to equip them with the skills necessary to problem solve when playground issues occur and will continue to work with them in expressing themselves clearly yet respectfully, and also in listening carefully and empathetically to the views of others.

### **Home Time**

If anyone else is collecting your child, please do let us know via the school office. If we have not been told that anyone else is collecting your child, we will not let them go at the end of the day even if it is with a parent in the class. Children in Y6 who have been given written permission from their adult are allowed to go home by themselves.
